

Homeowners asked to weigh in on priorities for next three-to-five years

Members of the Ocean Pines Strategic Planning Advisory Committee released a new survey designed to gather community input on top priorities for the next several years.

Committee Co-Chair Bernie McGorry said the goal for the survey is to capture a broad range of demographic and interest groups, including both young families and retirees, and full-time homeowners and seasonal residents.

The committee's target is at least 1,000 respondents, with at least 500 part-time residents and 500 full-time residents

taking part. The survey has 15 questions and should take less than 15 minutes to complete.

Committee members developed the survey after months of research, including detailed comparisons with neighboring homeowners' associations, a SWOT analysis — or lists of strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats — collected from Ocean Pines department heads, and input

from other Ocean Pines advisory committees.

"We also had some great input on the survey from residents," committee Co-Chair Moe Delcher said.

To take the community survey, visit www.oceanpines.org and click on the "Community Survey" link at the top of the page. There are also reminder cards with a QR code link to the survey available at several locations in Ocean Pines.

Those who wish to fill out a paper copy of the survey may do so by emailing info@oceanpines.org, or calling the administration office at 410-641-7717. Paper copies will also be available at the administration building and Public Works/CPI office, and at the visitor's

center at The Parke.

"The goal was to make the survey easy to find and simple to take part in," McGorry said. "And the data we collect, we hope, will help align Board members and management on priorities for the next three-to-five years, and give homeowners a say on that."

McGorry said individual survey responses would be strictly confidential, and the overall results will be shared

at a future town hall meeting and on the Ocean Pines website.

OPA extends Ortt Companies contract

At the request of General Manager John Viola, the Ocean Pines Board recently approved a fourth year on the Matt Ortt Companies' food and beverage management contract.

The Ortt Companies, led by co-founders Matt Ortt and Ralph DeAngelus, originally signed a two-year manage-

ment contract in 2017. Two years later, the Ocean Pines Board approved a three-year contract extension with incentives to trigger a fourth and fifth

The agreement is for the company, which also operates several independent restaurants in the Ocean City area, to run Ocean Pines' Yacht Club, Beach Club, and Clubhouse Bar and

COVID-19 had a negative impact on food and beverage revenue during the last fiscal year, but the Ortt Companies still managed close to the target of \$130,000 operating favorability that would have automatically triggered a fourth year.

Viola said the Ortt Companies finished roughly \$119,000 positive to budget overall during that time. Those numbers include federal grants given through the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP).



"With the PPP, the Matt Ortt Companies was basically \$11,000 short of the automatic trigger. However, they provided a lot of [community] service during COVID. They provided low-price family meals and delivery, [and] they were open the full year," Viola said.

> "They kept the entire team engaged and on the payroll, which is what PPP is for," he continued. "And that's important, because a lot of restaurants now ... are trying to open up and they can't get good people."

> DeAngelus added that, because of the way the company navigated through COVID, "The industry's number-one issue wasn't ours."

"We kept our core staff around, and we didn't ever have to close because of a shortage of people," he said.

Viola said the Ortt Companies also donated family meals to Ocean Pines Police, the Volunteer Fire Department, and the nursing staff at Atlantic General Hospital, and he highlighted positive trends for both overall revenue and banquet revenue during the current fiscal year. Several times this summer, the Ortt Companies set single-day and weekend-long sales records at the Yacht Club and Beach Club.

Prior to the pandemic, the Ortt Companies was credited for rehabilitating the image of Ocean Pines' food and beverage operations, now known for having vastly improved customer service and food quality.

DeAngelus said he likes to go back to a town hall meeting four years ago, when he and company leadership made a promise to several hundred Ocean Piners in attendance.

"I told them, we're going to make this your family and neighborhood destination again - the place to go for family and friends, so that they wouldn't have to leave the area to have a really good time, with great food and drinks and a stellar entertainment lineup," he said. "Obviously, we're very proud of what we've accomplished, and we feel like we've held true to our promise."

Additionally, breakfast and lunch items will be available for sale by the Kiwanis Club.



With the close of the legislative session in the spring, I have been making my rounds in all three counties of my Senate district, participating in local events, and assisting my constituents as we push through together for a strong health and economic COVID-19 recovery.

As I reflect on the many activities held across the shore this year, I found The Wall That Heals events held at the Worcester County Veterans Memorial at Ocean Pines

honoring our Vietnam veterans to be historic, emotional and uplifting for our entire community. On a personal note, it meant so much to our family to be with my Uncle Eddie Rohe, an Air Force Vietnam veteran, at the welcoming ceremony. I join with so many in Ocean Pines in recognizing and

thanking Marie Gilmore and all the volunteers who worked so hard to pull off a truly meaningful and healing experience for our Vietnam veterans and their families.

These type of events that unite us as neighbors and Americans seem especially impactful as we recover from COVID-19 on both the health and economic fronts. As more and more Marylanders were vaccinated, we saw the lifting of many restrictions that allowed for the full and safe reopening of local businesses. This could not have been possible without the outstanding service provided by our local health departments and medical providers who have been and still are working round the clock giving COVID-19 tests, holding vaccine clinics, and providing quality health care services for shore residents and visitors alike.

We are seeing an entrepreneurial spirit on the shore as we recover from COVID-19 with the opening of new businesses and ventures. Right here in Ocean Pines, Pip the Beach Cat, Serpone's Pizzeria, Royal Plus Electric, and the new location of the Ocean Pines Chamber of Commerce with a visitor center are among several new attractions opening up.

Other new Worcester County businesses include Salt & Company in West Ocean City, featuring Maryland retail items made by Worcester Technical High School students, and the exciting maiden voyage of the Black-Eyed Susan Riverboat in Snow Hill and the Christmas Sweet in Pocomoke.

Throughout this long and hot summer, virtually every industry sector has been facing severe workforce shortages, from hospitality, to construction, to health care, to public safety. I will continue my efforts to work with our job creators to recruit and

retain our shore workforce. As a way to encourage our talented youth to attend Maryland schools and pursue careers here on the shore, I want to put the word out on my Maryland Senate scholarship, which is available to students who live in my district and who attend and are in good standing in a Maryland community college or university. I am proud to represent three quality institutions of higher education in my district: Salisbury University, University of Maryland Eastern Shore, and Wor-Wic Community College. These three schools have earned a reputation of excellence with expertise in certain areas such as the teaching, nursing and business programs at Salisbury University; the agriculture, aviation and pharmacy programs at UMES; and public safety, welding and technology programs at Wor-Wic.

This September 2021, I participated in the groundbreaking of the new Applied Technology Building at Wor-Wic Community College, which will house industry training programs focusing on current and emerging technologies. Our local students will have the opportunity to train in a cutting-edge facility and will have a real advantage in being leaders in these industrial careers.

In closing, I wanted to share my thoughts on the significance of the 20th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks. From my guest column published in the Sept. 8, 2021 edition of *The Courier*, I wrote: "9/11 is seared in our nation's memory as the day that changed America, and it changed my life as well." Being at the Pentagon on 9/11, I witnessed the firefighters fighting their hearts out on the Pentagon roof; appreciated how all of us, military and civilians, came together to do our part in the War On Terror; and recalled

Guest column: Worcester Health offers fall fitness, nutrition and prevention programs

A message from the Worcester County Health Department

Looking for ways to get active, lose weight, or just pick up some healthy habits this fall? Worcester County Health Department has you covered! We are offering free programs like Just Walk, Worcester Wellness Weigh, Diabetes Prevention, and classes on how to quit smoking or vaping. Here's a snapshot of what's available in autumn.

- The Lower Shore Walking Tour is a self-directed, Tri-County event beginning Oct. 1 and running through the entire month. Residents are encouraged to register for the Lower Shore Walking Tour at Eventbrite. Participants will be emailed a map of local parks and trails. All participants are asked to take a photo of themselves being active and submit them for a chance at a grand prize. The first 50 to register and submit a photo will receive a free t-shirt. The more you participate in physical activity and send photos, the more tickets you will earn to be entered into the grand prize drawing. You can register online through Eventbrite: www.eventbrite.com/e/lower-shore-walking-tour-2021-tickets-168261912911.
- The Just Walk Fun Walk 2021-2022 schedule has been solidified. The first event is a self-directed walk set to take place on Oct. 6 at Cypress Park, Byrd Park and Stephen Decatur Park. Email Crystal.bell1@maryland.gov or visit JustWalkWorcester.org for more information.
- Free group classes for Worcester Wellness Weigh (family-focused healthy eating, physical activity, and weight management program), Tobacco Cessation (quitting smoking/vaping), and Lifestyle Balance (diabetes prevention) are available starting this fall. Call 410-632-1100 ext. 1108 for more information about these programs or visit WorcesterHealth.org.
 - The Worcester Wellness Weigh program includes free, wearable technology/fitness watches to help participants track their physical activity. The program is online and includes weekly coaching provided by trained physical activity and nutrition coaches. Participants have access to cooking demonstrations and grocery store tours, all from the comfort of their own homes. Individuals who have completed the program have experienced some very positive health outcomes, including improved eating and exercise habits, as well as weight loss.
 - Tobacco Cessation classes are designed to help individuals establish quit smoking plans and attain a tobacco-free lifestyle. These classes are taught by a trained smoking cessation educator. The program offers vouchers for cessation aids for those wishing to add these to their quit plan. The vouchers for smoking cessation help defray the cost of nicotine patches, gum, lozenge, and Chantix at participating pharmacies in the county.
 - The Lifestyle Balance diabetes prevention program is a year-long program proven to prevent Type 2 diabetes in those with prediabetes, those at risk for diabetes, and those with a history of gestational diabetes. The program helps you learn about healthy eating, physical activity, weight loss, and behavior change. You will work with a trained coach and people just like you, working together to make lifestyle changes to reduce your risk of developing Type 2 diabetes. You will participate in 16 weekly sessions, followed by once-a-month support sessions for the remainder of one full year. Participants will receive incentives like cookbooks, body weight scales, and more. Call 410-632-1100 ext. 1108 for more information or to enroll.

Guest column: Growth and development

Growth and development have been active in and around our district.

Atlantic General Hospital hosted a groundbreaking for the Gudelsky Family Medical Center that will be constructed along the southeastern end of Route 589, where the red produce stand currently stands. The 53,000 square-foot facility will include a multispecialty outpatient surgery center, pharmacy, labora-

tory and imaging services, as well as other specialty offices. The project is expected to be completed by early 2023.

One final note, for those who purchase their Christmas trees at the red produce stand, this will be the last year to do so.

Adjacent to the medical center, Wave Holdings has plans to construct a shopping center that will include general retail, a grocery store, a car wash, restaurant, and a gas/convenience store. They are working with State Highway Administration on a joint entrance, with AGH, along Route 589 to minimize the number of new traffic lights to just one. As I write this, I don't know what grocery store will be at the site.

There has been no further progress on the Thrive assisted living community planned for the north side of the soon-to-be-constructed AGH facility.

Pending final approvals, Royal Farms will construct a 5,100 square-foot store with eight gas pumps and a car wash at 11073 Cathell Road, near Walgreens and the Snowball Stand.

There are considerable plans along Route 50, especially around the Walmart and Home Depot locations. Aldi is currently doing major exterior work to their new location in Ocean Landings II. I don't have a date as to when this grocery store will open. Hardee's plans to construct a restaurant along Samuel Bowen Boulevard on a pad site

in front of Walmart. Zoom Car Wash plans to build a facility on a pad site in front of Home Depot.

There have been reports in the media that Worcester County was looking at a site at Route 589 and Route 113 for a proposed sports complex. It does not look as if this will happen, because the owner has not responded to

> county inquiries. It's likely another site in northern Worcester will be considered.

> In other news, the Worcester County Health Department successfully completed a review process to maintain national accreditation status through the Public Health Accreditation Board. This is a big deal, because it underscores what many residents, myself included,

have experienced with our local health department, that it is responsive to the public health needs of our community. This has been evident during the past year and a half, as the department has dealt with the changing protocols of the pandemic and assisted residents with testing and vaccinations.

The 2022 election is right around the corner; I will be filing for re-election in the very near future. I hope that I have earned your support. As the summer recently came to a close, Labor Day weekend was a big success for us all in Ocean Pines. We saw record crowds at our Yacht Club and Beach Club, and busy amenities across the board, including the Marina, Golf, Aquatics, and Racquet Sports. (also see pgs. 44-45)

Our Recreation and Parks Department enjoyed a great season, with many full camps for children and fun activities held for people of all ages. For all of us in the community, it was a much-needed return to normal after

the pandemic halted many of our activities a year ago.

Aquatics and Racquet Sports are both favorable to budget, thanks to organic growth on the revenue side and cost savings on expenses. Credit to Kathleen Cook and her team at Aquatics for producing, even while facing issues with staffing that were seen all across Worcester County. At Racquet Sports, several big tournaments are scheduled this fall. Terry Underkoffler and Tim McMullen have successfully grown our lesson program across multiple sports at the center, and they continue to demonstrate their strong customer service skills.

Golf Course maintenance efforts have been successful, and the course is in possibly the best shape in a decade, thanks to Course Superintendent Justin Hartshorne and his team there. Justin has put his education and experience to good use, and the results are easy to see. The reviews have been great, and people continue coming out to play our course.

Public Works is helping to oversee bulkhead replacement, now in the third year of a four-year plan to address those areas most in need of repairs. In this next phase, we will replace bulkheads with contractor Fisher Marine, who continues to be a strong partner for us. Fisher will also install our new T-docks for the Marina, which will be ready for next Memorial Day weekend.

Debbie Donahue, with assistance from Public Works, is overseeing beautification efforts that includes the North Gate, Wood Duck I and II, and the White Horse Park campus. Teal Bay and Bay Colony are next on our schedule, as we focus on landscaping and beautification efforts all around the Pines.

A partnership with the Ocean Pines Volunteer Fire Department and Worcester County is helping to maintain fire hydrants in the community that were difficult to find in case of an emergency. As of mid-September, that effort has helped clear 96 of the 176 hydrants that we have identified as issues.

The Finance team and Linda Martin from CPI are working on the DMA reserve study. A final draft of the reserve study will be reviewed by the Budget and Finance Committee and then presented to the Board in October.

Linda continues to work with Julie Malinowski from the Marketing and Public Relations Department on our customer service initiative, using the info@oceanpines.org email to answer questions in a timely and professional manner. The Public Relations Department is also helping with the community survey that was developed by the Comprehensive Planning Committee, and is now available.

Ocean Pines remains one of the safest communities in the state, thanks to the hard work and dedication of our Police Department and the fine leadership of Chief Leo Ehrisman. We are all grateful for their efforts.

Overall, the team continues to operate on all cylinders, with our latest financial results for August, showing a \$1.1 million positive variance to budget at this time. We hope to keep up that success throughout the fall, as we move into budgeting season.

Ocean Pines golfers raised \$1,200 during the 15th annual Ernie Stiles Bavarian Hops Scramble, held Aug. 27 at the Ocean Pines Golf Club.

The event, each year, is held in honor of the late Ernie Stiles and is hosted by the Ocean Pines Golf Members' Council. Don McMullen and Bob Long coordinated this year's event.

To date, the scramble has raised more than \$30,000 for local charities.

"Ernie's idea was simply to bring together some good people and go out for nine holes, have some good fun, and support some good causes," McMullen said.

Long said the event always has a lighthearted atmosphere. Longtime traditions include a toast, "Nostrovia," to good health before teeing off. Players then "head to the course and let their hair down a bit," he said.

"Ernie ran the Hops Scramble on his own for many years as a fun event," Long said. "He charged \$5 to play and all the money would get paid out to the skin winners. Often, no skins were cleared and the money would go to the charities."

Stiles created a stick figure, called "the Hops Guy," who holds a donation box and is placed at the seventh tee. Players donate a few dollars, or maybe more, as they pass by to tee up their shot.

Tournament proceeds often went to Stiles' favorite charities, Diakonia and the Humane Society, and money collected this year will again benefit those two organizations.

"In other years, the Hops Scramble helped local people who were having a tough time," Long said. "In 2017, the members took responsibility for the Hops Scramble and that year made significant donations to Cancer and ALS research. After Ernie's passing in 2018, we have again focused on local charities."

Along with the skins (the rewards for winning a hole outright), golfers vie for the coveted "Hops Hat" by getting closest to the pin on the seventh hole. Nongolfers, meanwhile, join in on the fun by being part of a grandstand where they cheer and jeer for players as they attempt their shots.

"Again, our members and friends had a great time at this annual event," McMullen said. "Congratulations to Kevin Brooks and Jeff Smith, who collected the only skins of the events and went home with all the prize money. And





congratulations to John Malinowski IV, who won the rights to wear the Hops Hat with his closest-to-the-pin shot at the seventh hole."

"Thanks to all for supporting the Humane Society and Diakonia, and thanks to Darin Stuiber and his group for adding to the celebration that took place at the seventh hole," Long added. "We hope to see everyone again next year!"

Winterizing efforts & landscaping underway

Just after Labor Day, Public Works started working on winterizing efforts across Ocean Pines, including closing our four outdoor pools and prepping our facilities for the colder months.

Our fall leaf collection will begin soon. We will pick up bagged leaves from Nov. 22 to Dec. 17, which is the same schedule we keep each year. The leaf vacuum truck will start on Nov. 29 and go through the community twice, as always.

For those who want to bring bagged leaves to the Public Works yard, that will be open Nov. 22 to Dec. 31. Please only drop off yard debris; no plastic will be accepted. The yard will be open Monday–Friday, 8 a.m. to 3 p.m., and Saturday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; closed Nov. 25-27 and Dec. 24-25.

Landscaping around signs for the sections in the community is also underway. We recently completed several of those and Public Works will continue to work on additional sections throughout the year.

We're also working on a joint effort with Worcester County and the Ocean Pines Volunteer Fire Department to paint Ocean Pines fire hydrants and clear the space around them, to make them more visible.

Along with our winterization efforts, the maintenance crew will soon be adding touchless watercoolers to all our facilities. These units will eliminate contact with the water dispenser and make germs harder to spread.

We will be replacing the lights on the piles at the Golf and Yacht clubs with new bollard lights, and we are also working on pricing for doors for the Golf Clubhouse to separate the lobby and banquet areas.

Public Works is finishing replacement of the bulkhead wall at the Golf Course between holes three and four, behind the Golf Maintenance building. We will then be doing emergency bulkhead replacements on Goldeneye Court, before moving to Pintail Drive and Crab Cay Court.


One of the major concerns over the summer was the removal of trees. While Ocean Pines is called "Ocean Pines" for the fabulous trees that adorn our community, there are times that

trees do need to be removed because of safety issues to homes (both to the applicant and the neighbor), or are diseased or dying, which is determined by a licensed arborist. A permit is required to remove any tree over 6 feet in diameter. Please contact the CPI Department if you have a tree that you need to remove, or if you are concerned about a neighbor removing

a tree without a permit. There were several homes that we issued violations on this summer that removed trees without a permit, and to comply they were required to replant trees.

After several long months of hard work and research by Ocean Pines employees along with DMA, the final draft of the reserve study will be ready soon. Both the working session with the Budget and Finance Committee, as well as the Board presentation, are scheduled for October. This report is a great tool for Ocean Pines to use for budgeting purposes, which departments will start working on for the next fiscal year shortly.

The customer service initiative, which was developed a few months ago, has been working well. Since its inception in late March, we have received over 800 phone calls and emails from homeowners, as well as those interested in Ocean Pines. Very healthy financial standpoint

Ocean Pines Association continues to remain very healthy from a financial standpoint, coming off an extraordinary summer featuring record revenues produced by the amenities. August year-to-date results have OPA tracking \$1.127 million favorable versus the budget. OPA amenity locations comprise \$857,000 of this

favorability, or approximately 76%. The Yacht Club, Golf and Aquatics amenities lead the way, tracking approximately \$261,000, \$222,000 and \$188,000 favorable to budget to date, respectively.

The audit report for fiscal year 2021 was completed and issued by TGM Group in July. OPA received another unmodified audit opinion on our financial statements. There were no proposed auditor adjustments that resulted from the audit.

OPA still continues to work with our vendor, Design Management Associates Inc. (DMA), to refresh/update our reserve study data. We have vetted all of the information in the draft report internally and are in the process of providing the information to the Budget and Finance Committee to review as well. This important information will be available and finalized prior to our "kick-off" of the fiscal year 2023 budget process, which is quickly approaching. As a reminder, this update is important in order to ensure that OPA has adequate reserves (general, bulkheads, drainage and roads) on hand to replace existing assets/infrastructure at the end of their useful life.

With the budget development "kick-off" approaching, I wanted to remind everyone of the improvements that have been made in budget development and monitoring through the Northstar system. This system has given OPA's budget managers, as well as the Finance team, the ability to drill into all accounting transactions and view real-time numbers by account on a daily basis. This real-time access to information is necessary in the role of a budget manager and will be utilized heavily in the upcoming fiscal year 2023 budget build. Department heads will be expected to produce current year-end budget estimates by account along with their 2023 funding requests.

Current updates and operations

OCEAN PINES POLICE DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS:

The full-service, 24-hour-a-day ope-ration of the Ocean Pines Police Department remains available to respond to the needs and calls for service during this unusual time as our community manages the pandemic and its effects on our

residents. Our officers and office employees have had to take major steps to protect themselves, as well as those they serve or assist every day.

PROTECTING YOURSELF & YOUR FAMILY:

During the summer months, Ocean Pines Police had an increase of reported thefts/fraud and scam cases from phone calls, emails and phone messages. The police investigations have found that many of these cases are from sources outside of the country. As these reported cases increase, the difficulty of solving the cases remains the same. We ask that you monitor all of your online banking, shopping and account purchases for yourself, and for other family members who are not technically sure of how to see suspicious activity on their accounts.

ARRESTS:

Ocean Pines Police have made several arrests for domestic violence. Most of these situations are alcohol- or drug-related. Remember that drugs and/or alcohol will not help with a domestic event. There are several hotlines and resources that may be used to assist with the domestic situations.

Many of our arrests this summer have resulted in charges of assault, property damage and protective orders, which all involve court appearances and legal fees.

Other arrests relating to drugs, alcohol violations and traffic offences continue to be handled by our officers.

DRUG OVERDOSES:

Ocean Pines also saw an increase in the number of drug overdose calls in the summer months. The police are here to help anyone battling the addiction of any drugs or alcohol to prevent these accidental overdoses. Ocean Pines Police are now connected with the LEAD team, which will become a large, faster link to resources to return to a normal healthier life.

SUMMER HOMES & CONCERNS:

We would like to remind homeowners that you are still responsible for the upkeep and behavior of your renters as required by HOA rules and regulations. Many resident owners call the police for violations such as parking and utility trailers. I would remind residents that the police will always respond to your calls for help. However, not all of those complaints are violations of Maryland law or traffic codes. It has been recorded on many social media outlets that "the police do nothing to help." Always remember that the complaint must be a law violation before police action may be enforced. Our officers always respond to your call for service with the intention to help.







Watch for our new signs: Keep Wildlife Wild



In the spring 2021 issue of the Ocean Pines Report, the Environmental and Natural Assets Committee (E&NAC) had an article informing residents of our initiative to educate the public placing new "KEEP WILDLIFE WILD" signs around our ponds. We indicated the reasons why people should not feed the local waterfowl and, because of our proximity to water, including Manklin Creek and the St. Martin River, that

water quality is a priority for the E&NAC.

It is worth repeating that many factors contribute to contaminated water: runoff of pesticides, fertilizers, animal droppings, local chicken factories and moldy food floating in our pond water intended to feed waterfowl. Extra heavy rainfalls can compound the levels of bacteria and that's why, in the summer months, beaches can close and our local waters are unsafe for swimming. From Memorial Day to Labor Day, residents can track the water quality with the Swim Guide App maintained by the Assateague Coastal Trust.

KEEP WILDLIFE WILD signs will soon be posted at our ponds. We are hoping these new signs will benefit both our residents and waterfowl by eliminating excess food pollution. Our previous article mentioned the disaster that occurred at Havre de Grace in Maryland in 2005 when hundreds of waterfowl died from botulism. Inappropriate foods such as potato chips, bagels, bread, and pretzel bites not only can cause bacteria to form in our pond waters, but this type of food is not nutritious for the birds and can also cause "Angel Wing" disease.


The new signs will be located around our ponds asking everyone to help conserve wildlife and their natural habitats. Bullet points on the signs explain the following reasons not to feed geese, ducks and other wild animals:

- Overcrowding (an abundant, unnatural food supply can contribute to the presence of more animals gathering in a space than normal)
- Poor nutrition (lack of sufficient nutrients contributes to malnutrition in waterfowl and can lead to Angel Wing, a deformity that can affect geese and ducks, in which the wing is twisted with the wing feathers pointing out laterally)
- Spread of disease (Ocean Pines wants to prevent what happened in Havre de Grace where botulism [food poisoning] spread among the waterfowl and killed them by the hundreds)
- · Unnatural behavior (waterfowl that do not have to forage

for a natural food source can behave in an abnormal manner by staying in an area past the average time they would migrate)

- **Pollution** (food supplied by humans can enter our pond waters and become moldy, causing bacteria to form; it is also considered littering)
- **Delayed migration** (any delay in migration could be detrimental to the birds' survival and reproduction since most geese head north to Canada for nesting in the spring)
- Safety concerns (water pollution, as mentioned previously, can cause botulism to form in the pond water, causing illness and death in waterfowl)
- Dependency on humans (wildlife fed by humans teaches them to depend on people for their food source that would not occur in the wild)

Since Ocean Pines is located on the Atlantic Flyway, we will always have waterfowl. Please help your E&NAC protect all residents, including our waterfowl, by respecting the new **KEEP WILDLIFE WILD** signs and by supporting our more humane efforts to control the waterfowl population. *Thank you for helping keep our wildlife wild!*



Beach Parking attendants offer friendly, familiar faces

Two former mail carriers and one former health care worker find sunny, seasonal retirement jobs

S ince the very beginning, the Ocean Pines Beach Club and Beach Club Parking have been unique and essential selling points for the community.

Just ask the people who work there.

"I think the Beach Club is probably one of the most underrated amenities that we have," longtime Beach Parking manager Dan Batt said. "A lot of people don't realize how nice the place is, until they come there and they see it for themselves. Many are really taken aback."

The combination of the Beach Club Pool, the bar and restaurant, the picturesque

stretch of beach along the Atlantic Ocean, and the private parking lot make it truly one of a kind, Batt said.

"You've got everything right there, and it's so close to Ocean Pines," he said. "I've gotten a lot of positive comments over the years."

For the last several years Batt has led a trio of attendants who help answer questions, check in guests, and guide them to parking spaces by the ocean.

Dan Batt

Batt grew up in Montgomery County, Maryland and worked for the U.S. Postal Service for 37 years. Upon retirement, he took a position at the Ocean City Inlet working for the Town of Ocean City, and then inquired about working for Ocean Pines, with Beach Parking.

Batt helped manage pool operators for Ocean Pines Aquatics for several years, during the winter, and for the last 14 summers he has managed Beach Parking.

He said the Beach Parking lot has been basically the same since it was originally developed by Boise Cascade in the late 1960s, with some small improvements. The wall around the Beach Club Pool was a later addition and, three years ago, the Association added a small "welcome hut" for the Beach Parking attendants.

What has been consistent each summer are the interesting sights, sounds, and stories of thousands of beachgoers – many coming from out of town.

"You've got all these people and, of course, they're on vacation. Sometimes the questions can be redundant, because each week you're dealing with a different group of people, and sometimes they can leave their common sense at home," he said with a laugh. "For the most part, I've met a lot of very, very



nice people, and we try to make it very friendly for them and try to make their experience a good one."

Batt said many guests from New York and New Jersey are surprised that "the beach is free."

"Up where they are, they have to pay. So, when you tell them they don't have to here, they're like, 'Really?' They just can't believe it!" he said.

One of his favorite parts of the job, Batt said, is watching the children grow up with each new season.

"You've got these little guys running

around, and the next thing you know they're pulling into the parking lot with a driver's license and getting ready to go to college. You just think, 'Wow, the time has really gone by!" he said.

Batt started the tradition of having attendants wear Hawaiian shirts to greet customers – a universal symbol that one has arrived at the beach, ready for sunshine and fun.

"I said to my wife, 'We need something recreational and beachy.' Of course, Seacrets has their little beach theme over there, so through the years I've tried out little ideas that I've had," he said.

When the Matt Ortt Companies took over Beach Club management several years ago, Batt said they went about cleaning out the stockrooms, which happened to include a large order of Hawaiian shirts.

"The next thing I know, the shirts are over at the Yacht Club and Ron Fisher (who runs the Ocean Pines Marina) apparently saw them. So, I go over to get the shirts and he had

already beat me to it – and they were all wearing our shirts!" Batt said.

"I went over to get some Marina gas one day, and it was so comical because when I walked up the lady said, 'Why are you wearing our shirts?' I said, 'No, no, no - you're wearing our shirts!" Batt said with a

laugh. "It was a pretty funny moment."

Although they temporarily moved his shirts, Batt said he was grateful to the Ortt Companies for bringing back former Beach Club Manager Lynda Huettner.

"She was my original boss and I worked for her for many years. She's awesome," he said. "We've had a lot of good times and worked with a lot of great, great people."

In prior years, Batt said he enjoyed working with J-1 students, who traveled here thanks to the federal Exchange









Visitor visa program. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the program hasn't operated normally during the last two years.

On the bright side, Batt said he's gotten to know the two newer Beach Parking attendants: Keith Thomas and Tom Possident. Both have been with Ocean Pines for the last two seasons.

"They really are awesome, awesome guys and they've been really great to work with," Batt said. "It's always been like a family here. You get to enjoy folks' company and everybody pitches in.

"We just try to make everyone's experience as pleasant as possible, and we're there for any questions that people may have," he added.

Tom Possident

Possident grew up in the Baltimore area and worked for the Worcester County Health Department before retiring two years ago. Shortly after, he took a job at Beach Parking.

"I was looking for something to do, and this sounded like something I would be

interested in, to keep myself occupied and keep my wife from doing me in," he said with a laugh.

Possident said most of the day is spent checking people in, answering questions, and "trying to be as friendly as you can."

He said business this year picked up after a slight dip in 2020 because of the pandemic.

"It was definitely more crowded than it was last year, and it seemed like a lot more people were coming from further distances," he said. "We saw a lot more from Florida, and of course from New York and New Jersey."

Possident said the workdays are mostly steady, with a small break generally between the morning and afternoon crowds.

"For the most part you're pretty busy," he said. "You get your morning people that come in, and they'll start rolling out usually about 1:30 or 2 p.m., and then you have the afternoon people who come in to replace them," he said.

That's not to say everything goes smoothly all of the time. He remembers one family frantically using a fork to fish out their Beach Parking pass after it got stuck in their car.

"The pass had fallen and gotten stuck between the dashboard and the front windshield, and they were renters and were worried about having to get it out of there, so they wouldn't have to pay a fee to their landlord," he said.

There are also plenty of questions to answer throughout the day.

"We get a lot of people who come up off the street that want to know if you have to pay to park on the street. We're constantly answering that question, and things like where does the boardwalk start, and even 'Where is Ocean Pines?" he said. "But I think we all get along and work well together. It's a good retirement job to keep me occupied," he added.

Keith Thomas

Thomas is originally from Chester County, Pennsylvania. Like Batt, he worked for the Postal Service before retiring several years ago.

"Most of the people here are pretty nice and it's been a great experience," he said. "You see a lot of families, and it's generally people who love the beach and the pool."

Thomas said Beach Parking is successful because it offers a solution to a common problem for vacationers – where do

you park at the beach?

"There's a lot of tight parking, so this is just a great place to park where you can go to the beach and use the pool. That's kind of a rare bird in Ocean City," he said.

A year ago, Thomas said many of the Beach Parking visitors were people who "just wanted to get outside" because of the pandemic.

"With COVID last year, I'd say we had less cars and less people. We had a little more cars this year," he said.

Aside from their normal duties, Thomas said the parking attendants can be something of a "lost and found" for the hundreds of customers who pass through.

"There's always stuff getting lost. We get a lot of car fobs and driver's licenses and IDs. We're always glad to get that stuff to people, when we find it," he said.

There are also some funny questions and encounters.

"I had two guys who came up to me because we had to scan their permits, and they were going to walk over to Seacrets and asked me if I had to stamp them so they could come back, like we were in a bar," he said with a laugh. "I said, 'No, you guys are free to go!"

All three attendants said they genuinely enjoy the work. It helps keep them busy, and the usually sunny disposition of the clientele makes for a positive atmosphere.

"We're all retired, so we're not under the gun and it's a pretty loose environment," Thomas said. "And it's great to see all the people having fun. They're happy to get there, and most of them are in a really good mood and enjoying their vacation or their time at the beach.

"That's why I like the job – it's pretty stress free and we're just moving people along, so they can go about having fun and having a good time," he added.

The Ocean Pines Beach Club and Beach Parking are open each Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend. Membership passes are available to homeowners, renters, and the general public.

Original lot salesman made his home in Ocean Pines

Talbott looks back on more than five decades as realtor and resident

SELLING OCEAN PINES FOR OVER FIVE DECADES

ohn Talbott has been in Ocean Pines since the very landed a full-time job teaching beginning, and more than 50 years later he still calls the history and geography in Upper Darby, Pennsylvania. During community home.

After traveling the country, Talbott came to Ocean Pines in 1968 as one of the original lot salesmen and he never left, eventually buying property and raising a family.

Today, he continues to be one of the community's best and most enthusiastic ambassadors.

On the road

Talbott is originally from suburban Philadelphia. He attended Millersville University (then Millersville College) in Pennsylvania and graduated with a bachelor's degree in education.

In 1959, he was drafted into the U.S. Army and served at Fort Jackson in South Carolina, and Fort Sill in Oklahoma.

At Fort Sill, Talbott joined the skydiving club and made 47 successful jumps. He was also part of the Fort Sill wrestling team that competed with other Army posts.

"Aside from that, I did like the Army food, which many people complained about, but I liked it," he said.

Talbott initially served in the infantry, but later had the opportunity to move into "a rather nice, air-conditioned building" in a new role. He was asked if he could type and fibbed "yes," and then quickly taught himself.

"I dealt with allied personnel from all over the world who came to Fort Sill to enter courses pertaining to artillery," he said. "I met a lot of people from various countries and it was a very interesting job."

While at Fort Sill, Talbott said the Army circulated a notice that, "If you were dissatisfied with your present MOS (military occupational specialty), you could volunteer to be an advisor in a place called Vietnam."

"I knew what Vietnam was and I was getting close to the termination of my duty," he said. "I didn't want to be an

advisor in Vietnam for a couple of reasons, but mainly because I was getting ready to get out of the service. So, I declined the opportunity to go."

After the Army, Talbott worked briefly as a substitute teacher near Philadelphia, and then

the sum-mers, he worked as a police officer in Ocean City, New Jersey.

After two years of teaching full time, Talbott said he realized he didn't enjoy "being cooped up in a classroom."

"I was young enough that I wanted to venture out, so I decided that I would try something new," he said. "I was single at the time and I was talking to some friends about this job where you travel around the United States, get paid good money, get to see the country, and you attend dinners and try and convince people to go down and look at property in Florida. So, I said, 'I think I'll give that a whirl!""

Talbott loved the American West and enjoyed traveling. To date, he's visited 48 of the 50 U.S. states - all but Alaska and

He later sold real estate in Florida, promoting the same projects he used to travel to speak about.

"That was a fun job and I enjoyed living in Florida, but then another friend of mine told me about these projects in various states throughout the country where you can sell lots on lakes. And that sounded rather interesting," he said.

Dirt roads and tree stumps

Soon after, another friend mentioned a project selling lots near Ocean City, Maryland.

"I said, 'Near the ocean?' and they said, 'That's right.' So, I said, 'When do you want me there?'" Talbott said. "I pulled into

town on the seventh day of July in 1968, and opening day was Friday, July 12. And the rest is history."

That history now spans more than five decades, as Talbott watched Ocean Pines grow "from a stretch of land that was completely wooded, to the beautiful

community that it is today."

In the very beginning, most of Ocean Pines was dirt roads and "coming soon" signs.

"There were not even many dirt roads in the beginning, because they had to create roads," he said. "But there were enough roads to show people the various lots and where they would be located, based on a map that we would show them."

Back then, he said, water trucks drove up and down the dirt roads, spraying them to keep the dust down.

"If you were traveling and had prospects in your car, and you veered a little bit to the left or the right off the main area that they had cleared, you would get stuck," Talbott said. "There was a gentleman by the name of Harry Wilkerson, and we used to call him up if we got stuck."

Talbott also had the tricky task of selling people on what would eventually be built, including waterfront homes on lots with no water.

He remembers taking potential buyers to empty lots where part of the forest was cleared of trees, but the ground was still covered in tree stumps. He would point to a stake with a red ribbon and explain that was the width of the canal, and the stake with the blue ribbon represented the center of the waterway.

"Here is Mr. and Mrs. Jones and their family, standing there, and I'm telling them there's going to be a canal – someday – and they're looking at these tree stumps," he said. "It was the same thing with the golf course lots. I would be standing there and saying, 'Do you see where this has all been cleared, way over there where the stake is?' And they would look at all these tree stumps and I would say, 'Well, that's going to be a beautiful fairway.'

"Some people had the vision to believe what was told to them and, of course, many people did not," he continued. "Those that did became purchasers. And those that did not, years later, said, 'Gosh, I wish we had done that. Look how it turned out!"

Talbott said he reassured potential buyers that Boise Cascade would spearhead the new development.

"Boise was a company that some people were familiar with and they were on the New York Stock Exchange, so it was a reputable company and they had done other projects throughout the United States," he said. "We would be able to show on a map where they had done the same thing – not as elaborate or as large as Ocean Pines – but they were successful projects."

Although much of the early development was left up to the imagination, Talbott said he instantly fell in love with the area.

"When I arrived on the seventh day in July of 1968, that's when I decided I wanted to stay," he said. "I liked the area and I had already done a lot of traveling. And I really, really liked being close to the ocean, so I think that's what prompted me to stay here.

"I proceeded to buy a lot and, as time progressed, I built a home and then I bought some other properties. We have one on the water now, which we love," he continued. "I probably bought more property than I should have and at one time I owned quite a few lots, but I believed in real estate, and it's enabled us to live the way we always dreamed."

Talbott started dating a local girl from Cambridge in 1976, and they were married in 1979. Today, he and his wife, Karen, have two daughters and two grandchildren.

Looking back, and enjoying the view

More than 50 years after he first arrived in Ocean Pines, Talbott continues to sell real estate, now as an associate broker for Berkshire Hathaway HomeServices PenFed Realty.


"I don't work as hard today as I used to," he said with a laugh. "Being a Realtor, you have the ability and the freedom to work as much or as little as you wish. However, if you want to be successful and earn money, you can't work as little as you want – you have to really do it full time. You're working Saturdays and Sundays and those could be your two busiest days. You don't really have off, like most normal jobs."

Back in 1968, Talbott said he never dreamed Ocean Pines would grow into what it is today, in part because the community was being sold as a resort getaway rather than the largest residential community in the county.

"I didn't foresee it being as successful as it turned out to be, but I've been in the community since the beginning and I've thoroughly enjoyed it," he said. "I actually marvel, every day, when I drive around. I like the beauty of the trees and the landscaping that the community offers, and the way that it was put together.

"And, of course, you can't overlook the amenities! You can't duplicate what we have here, and you can't create waterfront properties anymore," he continued.

"To this day, if I'm by myself running an errand, I will take in the beauty that the community offers. I really enjoy the environment, and I think a lot of other people would share the same feeling," Talbott said.



Gilmore receives 2021 Sam Wilkinson Award

Volunteer honor recognizes longtime Veterans Memorial Foundation president and recent 'The Wall That Heals' efforts

n a memorable moment during an otherwise abbreviated annual meeting on Aug. 14, Marie Gilmore received the 2021 Sam Wilkinson Award for volunteerism.

Since 2003, the award has recognized local people who dedicate their time and talents to help others.

The award also honors the memory of its namesake, 8-year-old Sam Wilkinson, who died in a tragic water accident in Ocean City.

Sam played soccer in Ocean Pines and his father, Bob, was a volunteer coach for Ocean Pines Recreation programs. The award was established to recognize a volunteer within the Recreation and Parks Department.

"[Sam] was a part of everything that we do, all our sports and all our programs, and his father was a coach and a volunteer. So, we give an award every year in honor of him," Recreation and Parks Director Debbie Donahue said.

Donahue said this year she looked outside of the department and found her volunteer of the year "at one of our most beautiful parks in Ocean Pines, the [Worcester County] Veterans Memorial."

"Although there are many volunteers at the Veterans Memorial, there is one person that stands out in her efforts in making the memorial such an amazing location," Donahue said.

Donahue, in a stirring and emotional speech, highlighted Gilmore's many contributions to the community.

Gilmore, she said, moved to Ocean Pines from Rhinebeck, New York in September 1995.

"Always being interested in volunteering in her community, she joined the Women's Club of Ocean Pines," Donahue said. "She was very active in the club and served three years as club secretary and two years as club president."

Donahue said Gilmore also volunteered in Ocean Pines with the Garden Club, Craft Club and Boat Club, and

locally with the American Legion Post No. 166 Auxiliary, and the Ocean City Parrot Head Club. While serving on the Ocean Pines Recreation and Parks (advisory) Committee, she cochaired the successful fund-raising effort to build a skate park in Ocean Pines.

"As if this was not enough, she was invited to join the Veterans Memorial Foundation by Sharyn O'Hare and Roseann Bridgman. She accepted the invitation and became a board



member in 2005," Donahue said. "She held the position of secretary for two years and president nine years, and currently serves as the president."

As president of the Veterans Memorial Foundation, Donahue said Gilmore helped set up an education program for all fifth graders in Worcester County. She also led programs, events and exhibits including Patriots' Pathway, Flags for Heroes, Wreaths Across America, the POW/MIA tribute, and

the Battlefield Cross.

"She has grown the memorial into the wonderful tribute and celebration to all veterans in our community," Donahue said.

Last year, Gilmore led the historic effort that brought the national "The Wall That Heals" program to Ocean Pines.

"She, along with many other volunteers, worked diligently for three years to convince them to bring the wall to Ocean Pines. And what an amazing event that was!" Donahue said. "Even through the pandemic, she was able to work through challenges and managed to continue all of the mentioned efforts at the Memorial.

"She has put in countless hours volunteering for her community. She is one of the most amazing women I know and is so well respected in this community," Donahue continued. "Please join me in showing our abundant gratitude for all her efforts and all of the time that she has put into making Ocean Pines an amazing community."

The crowd inside the community center rose to a standing ovation, and a tearful Donahue greeted Gilmore as she came

to the podium to accept the award.

"I will accept this award – it has my name on it, but it's really the Veterans Memorial Foundation who deserves this award," Gilmore said. "There is nothing that I have done that I would have been able to do without the backing of a fabulous board of directors, and we've had many, many volunteers throughout the years serving on our board and we have a

wonderful board right now. But, most importantly, we have the backing of the Board of Directors of Ocean Pines."

Gilmore said the Worcester County Veterans Memorial was dedicated in 2005, and she credited "two amazing women with the great idea to put a flagpole at the south end of Ocean Pines."

"Full credit to Roseann Bridgman – God bless her in heaven – and to Sharyn O'Hare, who thankfully still serves as ... a director emeritus on our foundation so we can pick her brain



Since its inception, the memorial has grown into a singular landmark in the region, each year drawing thousands of attendees for Memorial Day and Veterans Day events, as well as educating hundreds of local children, and inspiring countless more local people.

This year, despite having to contend with a global pandemic, the Veterans Memorial captivated the community once more during the weeklong "The Wall That Heals" exhibit, which honored the more than 58,000 U.S. service members who made the ultimate sacrifice during the Vietnam War.

"Thank you so much to, not only the Board of Ocean Pines, but the Ocean Pines Public Works, who worked tirelessly for a year to be sure that we could host The Wall That Heals," Gilmore said. "It looked like a simple thing, driving a trailer in and setting up a wall. Believe me, there was a lot of infrastructure that went into doing that.

"I thank you all for this award," she continued. "This is quite an honor. I'm humbled by it. And I love Ocean Pines, I love you all. Thank you."



Local family turns tragedy into nationwide nonprofit promoting kindness

ongtime Ocean Pines residents Jackie and Ron Kurtz, for the last three years, have worked to spread messages of hope through their "Matt's Kindness Ripples On" campaign.

Originally from the Rockville, Maryland area, the family has owned a home in Ocean Pines for about 20 years and lived in the Pines during the last dozen years.

Their son, Matt Kurtz, died tragically in 2017. He was just 32. The "Matt's Kindness Ripples On" website and nonprofit group was started shortly after, to honor his optimism and compassion for others.

"It started as a tribute to our son, Matt, who died by suicide. But the true cause of his death was mental illness," Jackie Kurtz said. "Matt was just a super smart, really humble person who greeted everyone he met with a nonjudgmental heart. He was just a person who practiced everyday acts of kindness as a way of life."

After his passing, Kurtz said the family was overwhelmed with stories of Matt's charitable deeds.

"So many people told us that he changed their lives with his kindness," Kurtz said. "So, we decided to do this website and blog, with the mission to keep Matt's kindness going. Really, the mission is to make our world better, one kindness at a time."

The nonprofit, since 2019, has given out roughly \$6,000 in "Kindness Awards" and "Kindness Grants." The grants help support charitable acts, while the awards are given to inspirational people.

"We use the award to recognize people who make kindness a way of life, just like Matt did," Kurtz said. "Part of it is, there are so many kind and compassionate people out there, but all the attention is given to people who behave badly. We want to change the focus and share with the world these inspirational people."

Anyone can submit a nomination for the award, and winners are given a certificate of appreciation and \$250.

"We ask them to spend it on themselves, because kind people tend to give so much to others and neglect themselves. So, we say, 'This is for you to take care of yourself" Jackie said. "And we share those people and their stories, to try and bring more attention to that."

The grants, on the other hand, are selected from a pool who have sent proposals for a kindness project.

"Anyone can submit an idea for an 'Act of Kindness' project, and we give \$250 to help them with their project," Kurtz said.

Recipients for both honors have ranged from local people, to those living in Virginia, New York, Connecticut, Iowa, Indiana, Ohio, Missouri, Nevada, Texas, Florida, California and Hawaii.

"The very first Kindness Award went to a local person, Linda McGean, who is a counselor at Ocean City Elementary School,"



Kurtz said. "Another local person, Jude Al-Hamad, read about the award and applied for a grant. She made packages for the Believe in Tomorrow organization here locally."

Kurtz said the youngest award winner was Silas Scauzillo of Rockledge, Florida, a 9-year-old who started a "Kindness Squad" at his school.

"It's amazing, all the different ideas that [grant and award winners] have come up with," she said. "It's been everything from a guy who used his stimulus check to start a nonprofit to take inner-city kids fishing and help mentor them, to people who have dealt with issues like literacy, homelessness, animal shelters, and help for cancer patients.

"It's been awesome to see the creativity that people have come up with, to help others," she continued. "It's been beautiful and inspirational, and I feel lucky that I get to read all of these nominations. The only bad part is, everybody that applies or nominates deserves an award. There's just so many amazing people and we can only give so many out."

Kurtz said the nonprofit has committed to support at least two awards and two grants each year. However, donations to the nonprofit have made it possible to expand the programs.

"We've been very lucky that people have been donating to us," she said. "One hundred percent of donations have gone to additional awards and grants. That's been really humbling too."

While donations have also come from all over the country, Kurtz said the local community of Ocean Pines has been incredibly supportive of the nonprofit.

"A lot of people have talked to me about it. They've reached out and shared stories, and nominated people for awards," she said. "We've also received donations. It's wonderful that so many people have supported us and what we do, and they've been there for us through the heartache and the grief.

"I feel very lucky. We have some very amazing friends and neighbors here that have been super supportive of us," she added.

Jackie's husband, Ron Kurtz, is also active locally through the Ocean Pines Pickleball Club. As the club treasurer, he's helped raise funds for many charitable groups.

"They've been using their membership money to donate to some great organizations, which has been wonderful," Jackie said.

As for what Matt would have thought of the project, Jackie said he "would have absolutely loved it."

"He'd want to be involved so much," she said. "He was all about kindness and being a good person and spreading goodwill."



About Ocean Pines Easements

What is an easement?

An easement gives a person, company or government the right to use all or part of a property for a specific purpose, without granting any ownership rights.

Are there easements on my property?

Yes. Easements are the areas on your property 5 feet in width along the side property lines and 10 feet in width along the front and rear property lines. Although this area is owned and maintained by the property owner, they may be used by utility companies, Worcester County, and for drainage flow as needed.

What types of easements are found in Ocean Pines?

Drainage easements are for the use and maintenance of drainage. They are 10 feet in width unless otherwise specified and are centered on the existing drainage ditches.

Well easements are for installation and maintenance on well lots and are shown on the property's recorded plat, or land plot.

Slope easements are for maintenance and permanent stabilization control of slopes. Slope control areas will be noted on the property's recorded plat.

Utility easements are for construction, operation and maintenance of electrical, telephone, cable and other utilities. These easements will be granted upon request of the applicable utility. They are 5 feet in width along side property lines and 10 feet in width along the front and rear property lines. Although not shown on the plats, these easements have been dedicated to the utility companies.

Waterway easements are for drainage, maintenance, dredging and preservation of navigation and recreational use of waterways.

Bulkhead easements are for the maintenance and preservation of bulkheads and similar waterfront improvements. Owners of lots contiguous to a waterway may not fill beyond the bulkhead or high-water lines and must have approval from the Architectural Review Committee to build a structure that is on or extends into any waterway.

Am I required to take care of my property that's part of an easement?

Yes. Lot owners should continuously maintain easements.

Is there anything I'm not allowed to do on an easement?

Yes. Lot owners need to make sure that no structures, plantings or other material are placed in a way that would interfere with the installation or maintenance of utilities, change the direction of flow or the speed of drainage, or damage or interfere with slope or create erosion or sliding problems.

Also, lot owners are prohibited from placing or erecting structures, light-reflecting devices, signs or other obstacles higher than 10 inches in an Ocean Pines drainage easement area, which is generally the area that extends from the residence side of a front drainage ditch to the edge of the road.

Do I need approval if I'll be doing construction within an easement?

Yes. Approval by the Architectural Review Committee is required for any construction project within an easement.

Do I need approval for landscaping within an easement?


No. Plantings and landscaping do not require approval. However, they may not be placed in a way that would interfere with the installation or maintenance of utilities, change the direction of flow or the speed of drainage, or damage or interfere with slope or create erosion or sliding problems.

Keep in mind that landscaping or structures located within an easement may be subject to damage during the installation of utilities. Any cost of replacement or repair to such landscaping or structures from utility work is the responsibility of the property owner.
