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## You are not alone: Help for those caring for loved ones with Alzheimer's and dementia

Support group meets twice a month in Ocean Pines

For several years, Billie Chambers struggled to cope with each new symptom of her husband's dementia.

"In the beginning, his symptoms were intermittent: sometimes surprising, annoying, quirky, but manageable," she said. "Near the end, his symptoms were increasingly debilitating, sadly predictable, fright-

ening, and nearly impossible for one person to manage."

For those struggling to care for a loved one with Alzheimer's or dementia, Chambers' message is simple: you are not alone.

The MAC Alzheimer's/Related Dementia Caregivers Support Group meets twice each month at the Ocean Pines Library, offering caregivers professional support, access to resources, and encouragement from others in similar situations. Meetings are held on the second and fourth Thursday of each month, from 3-4 p.m.

"Dementia is an ugly disease, and increasingly common. It can suck the life out of those who have it as well as the people who care for them at home," Chambers said. "Throughout the years of Paul's dementia, we were blessed with the support of family and friends, for which I'm forever grateful. And yet, as with most life

changing events, until you are actually living it, you can't truly understand it.

"And that is the value of being part of our local dementia/Alzheimer's support group," she continued. "Everyone is being affected by some stage of the disease. Each person can offer help and insights that only experience brings. For me, taking part in

the group educated me, calmed me, sometimes made me laugh, and gave me hope that I could handle both our present life and what the future might hold."

"If you have questions, need help, or

just need to vent a little, this is a great place to start," Chambers added.

Margaret White has run the meetings in Ocean Pines for about a year and a half. She is the director of the Life Bridges program for MAC Inc., a Salisbury-based group created to help older adults live with dignity and thrive in their homes and community. MAC is one of the oldest agencies on aging in the United States.

"In the Ocean Pines community and surrounding area, we know that there is a need out there and we need to make sure people are aware this is available to them," she said. "We really have an interest in how we can reach the community (cont. on pg. 2)



(cont. from pg. 1) and let them know we are holding these meetings, and that we are there for them," she said.

Mark Bender, an Ocean Pines resident, has cared for his wife, who has Alzheimer's, for eight years. He's been going to support meetings for six years.

"It's basically a group of people that has the same issues, and you can talk about your problems and try to help

each other," he said. "It helps just to hear other people tell their stories and hear their suggestions."

He said those, like himself, who have been caring for someone for an extended period are able to share their knowledge.

"You let people know what the journey is going to be like, especially for those in the first year or the second year," he said. "It can certainly help to hear other stories. And you don't even have to share – you can just listen."

For many, White said caring for a partner with Alzheimer's or dementia can be one of the biggest challenges of their lives. That's why the help, support and experiences of others is so important.

"Some people are a little tentative at first, but most realize the support, the friendships, the information that they receive is so helpful," she said. "Having the opportunity as a



caregiver to step away for a few moments each month and be able to be with others who are going through similar situations – they can be understood and they can get that support they so greatly need.

"They also build a bond," she continued. "Most of the time, the facilitators stay quiet. We're there to support and we will answer questions."

Bender said there are many in Ocean Pines who could benefit from the support group.

"It's definitely helpful, especially for new people going through this," Bender said. "It can be so overwhelming in the first couple years."

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### Pines Steppers seek new members

Square dancing club has been active in Ocean Pines for four decades

The Pine Steppers Square Dance Club is seeking new members to help local people stay active, make new friends, and get dancing.

Square dancing gets its name from the shape of the group of dancers. Four couples, or eight total dancers, are arranged in a square with one couple on each side and facing the middle.

The dance borrows elements from traditional 16th century dances from England, France, and other parts of Europe. It traveled to the United

States with early European settlers and further developed into its present-day form.

In 1982, President Ronald Regan officially named the square dance as the national folk dance of the United States.

In Ocean Pines, the Pines Steppers club started in the 1980s and was incorporated in 1994 as part of the Delmarva Square Dance Federation.

In the mid-1990s there were as many as nine active local clubs. Today, there are only two remaining.

Current Club President Barbara C. Roos got involved in square dancing because of her mother and father, who were active in Dover.

"My husband was taking lessons with them, and I was working at a chamber of commerce in New Jersey where I

took lessons. I would come down on weekends to dance with them," she said.

That later led to the couple joining the Pines Steppers in Ocean Pines, and Roos becoming an officer.

"I got more involved, and now I've been president for the last three years and it looks like I'm going to be the president again this year," she said. "I

inherited an enthusiastic and dedicated club."

Roos said club members regularly travel from Salisbury and the Dover, Delaware area to take part in classes and events

Workshops are scheduled every Wednesday evening from



7-8:45 p.m. at the Ocean Pines Community Center on 235 Ocean Parkway, and dances are held on the third Saturday of each month.

New members learn 50 basic calls and dance to music choreographed by professional callers from



Maryland, Virginia, Delaware, Pennsylvania, and New Jersey.

Workshops usually have "two squares" of eight people each, and the dances can have upwards of three squares.

"We have more ladies than we have men, so a lot of the ladies can dance the male parts too," Roos said. "But we could definitely use more male dancers."

Roos said no prior experience is needed to join, and all are welcome in the square. New dancers are

assigned an "angel," or a veteran dancer, to help get them started.

"We also encourage people to go on YouTube, so they can watch and maybe do some of the lessons at home," Roos said. "The first four lessons are free, and if they are really interested and they want to continue, we have a 12-week class and we ask everyone to pay \$4 so we can pay for the caller."

Roos said many veteran dancers continue with the classes for years. Longtime members pay \$5, also to help pay for the callers.

Both couples and individuals are welcome to join.

"We always say if you have two feet and hands, you can dance," Roos said. "We have so much fun because we laugh

at ourselves and laugh with each other. It's a merry group."

It's also great exercise.

"If a lady does every dance at the workshop, then she goes four miles," Roos said. "The lady is on the outside of the square, so she has to walk a little farther than the guys.

"More than anything, we're a family,"

Roos continued. "It's camaraderie. We watch out for each other and pick each other up, and it's just fun."

She said many dancers also share another passion: food. "We share recipes, and we try to outdo each other when

we have our dances," she said.

"But we're looking for more Ocean Pines people, and we just want to stay active and involve as many people as possible," Roos added.

The Worcester County Health Department can support you in successfully forming new and healthy habits by encouraging you to give the new habits your attention and focus, and by repeating the habits with intention. We have multiple ways to get you active and prevent chronic diseases like diabetes and heart disease with programs like Just Walk, Worcester Wellness Weigh, Lifestyle Balance Diabetes Prevention, and classes on how to quit smoking or vaping. We also have a cooking show called "What's Cooking in Worcester" and a brand-new resource guide to help you find delicious and nutritious foods grown right here in Worcester County.

These programs and classes are free and priceless. Here's a rundown of what's available this fall.

- Just Walk is an incentivized physical activity program. Report your mileage, and we will mail you a package. At each milestone you reach, you'll receive a prize! The first prize available is after reaching 25 miles. From the beach to bay, woodlands to parkland, there is a location and surface for everyone to be active as part of a fitness regimen, to socialize, or just for the joy of it. You can find 15 maps of local trails by visiting justwalkworcester.org.
- Tobacco Cessation classes help individuals establish quit smoking plans and attain a tobacco-free lifestyle. These classes are taught by a trained smoking cessation educator. The program offers vouchers for cessation aids for those wishing to add these to their quit plan. The vouchers for smoking cessation help defray the cost of nicotine patches, gum, lozenges, and Chantix at participating pharmacies in the county. Classes are available to adults and adolescents aged 14-17.
- The Lifestyle Balance Diabetes Prevention Program is a year-long program proven to prevent type 2 diabetes in those with prediabetes, those at risk for diabetes, and those with a history of gestational diabetes. The program helps you learn about healthy eating, physical activity, weight

loss, and behavior changes. You will work with a trained coach and people like you to make lifestyle changes to reduce your risk of developing type 2 diabetes. You will participate in 16 weekly sessions, followed by once-amonth support sessions for the remainder of one full year. Participants will receive incentives like cookbooks, body weight scales and more.

- What's Cooking in Worcester? Pumpkin whoopie pies, chocolate chia seed pudding, and chili-lime chickpeas! "What's Cooking in Worcester" airs on our Facebook and YouTube pages.
- Worcester Wellness Weigh is a technology-based, healthy lifestyle and weight-loss program for families ready to work together to lose weight, eat healthier, increase physical activity, and improve their overall health.
- Eat Healthy. Eat Local. Live Well. Our newly designed guide helps readers locate and access fresh, nutritious, high-quality foods in Worcester County and is filled with information on proper portion control, food budgeting, local food pantries, community gardens, local farmer's markets and grocery shopping on a budget.

### Treatment plant, sports complex updates

The Maryland Department of the Environment mandates that water and sewer districts pay the Bay Restoration Fee (BRF). This fee is assessed to plants that have accepted federal/state dollars or that have not met their discharge permit limits. The annual fee is \$60 per ratepayer.

The Ocean Pines Water Wastewater Treatment Plant has not and does not accept federal or state subsidies. And for many years, because the plant has met discharge permit limits, Ocean Pines ratepayers have not been assessed the BRF.

Unfortunately, the plant did not meet its limit due to a clogged pipe under clarifier and treatment unit 4 that was discovered on Jan. 10, 2021. There is no direct access to the line. To get to the pipe, it was necessary to drain the clarifier and lower the level in the treatment unit. Operators and outside contractors worked for over 24 hours and were eventually able to clear the line.

The source of the clog was discovered to be a rake head. Operators use rakes on top of the treatment units to clear floating debris. It is believed an employee was using the rake when the head came off the handle and fell to the bottom of the treatment unit. The incident was not reported, so there is no way to determine when the incident occurred or who the employee was. Timely notification could have avoided subsequent events.

Once the line was cleared, the operators began to refill the clarifier and treatment unit. Both were refilled by Jan. 12. The water used to refill the tanks was cold. The water in the treatment tank eventually got as low as 45 degrees. The cold weather inhibited microbial growth and digestion, which in turn reduced the microbe's ability to process the nitrogen in the water. In normal operations there is a large population of microbes present in the tank, significantly larger than what is found in the raw waste stream, hence the need for the population to regrow to pre-drained levels.

Worcester County administration appealed to the secretary of MDE and the governor's office requesting the BRF be waived due to operational issues, but the requests were denied.

As a result, the service area is required to pay the BRF, which is about \$540,000. How should this fee be paid and who should pay it?

It was the position of Commissioner Jim Bunting and me that because the limits were exceeded due to county employee negligence (by not reporting that a rake head had fallen into the unit), Ocean Pines service area ratepayers should not be penalized with an additional quarterly water bill assessment of \$15 for four billing periods. Despite our efforts to have the county's general fund pay the fee, it was ultimately decided the fee would be paid for with money from the service area's reserve fund. As a result, even though the fee will be paid from the reserve, which has been paid into by ratepayers through the years, there will be no additional assessment on individual ratepayer quarterly

Since the clog was removed, plant operations have continued normally. Permit limits have been met since March 2021. Public Works will apply for an exemption to the Bay Restoration Fee in 2022. Applying for the exemption is an annual process and, prior to 2021, Ocean Pines has been granted the exemption every year since the Bay Restoration Fee was established. It is hoped

the service area will once again not have to pay the fee. In other news, it was decided at the Sept. 20 meeting that the settlement date for the \$7.1 million land purchase for a proposed sports complex adjacent to Stephen Decatur High School would be postponed to Jan. 31, 2023. There is still no funding source identified to pay for the land or the development and management of a facility. Further, no discussions have occurred between county government and Ocean City officials, who strongly advocated for the project and said there was a financial interest by the town to assist with the project. Neither have there been any talks with town of Berlin officials about the project.

And one last note. It is expected that by the end of the year, a new emergency siren will be installed to replace a currently out-of-service unit on the Ocean Pines water tower.

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
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






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### Message from the OPA BOARD PRESIDENT



"We are all equally valued as volunteers, bringing a wealth





### Then and Now:

### Annual GM report maps progress and charts future course

Ocean Pines General Manager John Viola, during the Annual Meeting on Aug. 13, said it was "a tale of two Associations" when he came on as a volunteer CFO in 2017. Viola had been the chairperson of the Budget and Finance

Committee and was called up for a larger role.

"Back then I remember thinking ... it was the worst of times, but I truly believed that the best of times were coming," he said.

At the time, the Association had a \$1.6 million deficit and many other issues, Viola said.

"Our bulkheads, drainage, dredging and road programs needed to be jumped started. [And] we needed to implement a new plan," he said, adding there was a need for a forensic audit and a compensation study. He said there was also a call to improve request for proposal practices to get better bids for big projects, and to outsource food and beverage operations.

All of that has since been accomplished.

Starting in 2019, when Viola took over as general manager, the Association formed work groups and restarted the drainage and bulkhead programs, commissioned an employee compensation study, made improvements to Board meeting videos, and transitioned to Northstar software and a new website.

"After a \$1.2 million budget deficit from the prior year, we closed April 2019 with a \$130,000 positive variance," Viola said. "You could see back then ... that the ship was starting to turn in a positive way."

To help offset issues related to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the Association secured federal Paycheck Protection Program funding, installed communitywide safety protocols, and brought in several major construction projects on time and under budget including the new Golf Club, cart barn, and a modernized Police station.

In 2021, the Association continued to navigate through the pandemic with a successful communication plan and a **budget favorability of \$1.275 million**. With that success, the prior-year deficits were finally erased.

That year also saw new drainage projects, improved Golf Course maintenance, a jump-started roads program, beautification efforts, the introduction of the virtual Ocean Pines Academy, and the launch of new customer service efforts centered around the info@oceanpines.org email address. Food and beverage operations set new records, strategic planning efforts formally began, and a new playground and new Craft Club building were opened.

In 2022, Ocean Pines produced a **record-setting budget favorability and a record-setting \$100** assessment reduction. New pickleball courts were opened, the Golf operation became favorable, Aquatics and Recreation and Parks programs thrived, Marina slips had a waitlist, and infrastructure improvements and beautification efforts included the North Gate Bridge and mailboxes and pedestals. The Association also debuted online voting and hybrid Board meetings and began codifying a strategic plan.

"The team, across the board ... [is] operating on full cylinders," Viola said.

Viola said current initiatives include installing cheaper and more efficient drainage pipe liners, continuing the bulkhead and dredging programs, landscaping and beautification efforts, improvements to the North Gate Bridge, improvements for hybrid meetings, new T-docks at the Yacht Club Marina, *(cont. on pg. 17)*

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



### **Current updates and operations**

### OCEAN PINES POLICE DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS:

The full-service, 24-hour-a-day operation of the Police Department, through its dedication and commitment, remains available to respond to the needs and calls for service during this unusual time as our community, along with many other

workforces, manages through this current time of economic struggles.

### PROTECTING YOURSELF AND FAMILY:

During the summer months the Police once again had an increase of reported thefts/fraud and scam cases from phone calls, emails and phone messages. Our investigations have found that many of these cases are from sources outside of the country, which increases the difficulty of solving them. Some of these cases used our own Board members' names and job titles to attempt to scam funds from residents. The Police ask that you monitor all your online banking, shopping and account purchases for yourself and for other family members who may not have the technical ability to see suspicious activity on their accounts.

### **ARRESTS:**

The Police have made several arrests for domestic violence. Most of these situations are alcohol- or drug-related. Remember that drugs and/or alcohol will not help with a domestic event. There are several hotlines and resources that may be used to assist with domestic situations.

Many of our arrests this summer have resulted in charges of assault, property damage and protective orders, all of which involve court appearances and legal fees.

Other arrests related to drugs, alcohol violations and traffic offenses continue to be handled by our officers.

### DRUG OVERDOSES:

Ocean Pines also saw an increase in the number of drug overdose calls in the summer months. The Police are here to help anyone battling the addiction of any drugs or alcohol to prevent these accidental overdoses. The Police are now connected with the "Lead Team" (part of the Vulnerable Adult Task Force), which will become a larger, faster link to resources to return to a normal healthier life.

### A GREAT LOSS TO OUR COMMUNITY:

The Ocean Pines Police Department recently reported the passing of retired Sgt. John Cabala. As we continue to serve, many of us who had the privilege to work alongside Sgt. Cabala are better officers for the lessons he taught and miss the partnership that we had with him, both on and off the job.

Please remember that the Police in your community not only work cases, respond to calls and enforce traffic laws. They are also here to help you, and to serve you and care for you and your family, as well as your property.

wanted to do that for all that we had done for him," she said.

"And we spent a lot of time sitting in my office talking

about a lot of different things," Donahue continued. "He was a very, very dear friend of mine. Unfortunately, Mr. Chinn is not able to be here, because he passed suddenly."

Donahue said the 2022 award was already slated for Chinn, before his passing last August.

"So, we went ahead and decided that, even though he couldn't be with us, we were still going to give it to him," she said, adding she would accept the award on his behalf and make sure his widow, Wilma, received it.

"I loved him dearly," Donahue said.

Since 2003, the Sam Wilkinson Volunteer Award has recognized local people who

dedicate their time and talents to help others.

The award also honors the memory of its namesake, 8-yearold Sam Wilkinson, who died in a tragic water accident in Ocean City.

Ralph E. Chinn

Ralph Chinn was a ubiquitous volunteer in Worcester County for many years, working both with the Kiwanis Club of Greater Ocean City-Ocean Pines, and with the Ocean Pines Recreation and Parks Department.

On Aug. 13, Ocean Pines Recreation and Parks Director Debbie Donahue posthumously named Chinn as the

recipient of the 2022 Sam Wilkinson Volunteer Award.

Donahue said Chinn was a dear friend who always helped, and always listened.

"If you needed a volunteer, he was always there," she said. "No matter what I asked him to do, no matter what it was for – if it was cleaning the kitchen, cleaning the flattop, reading a book to my kids – it really didn't matter. He was always in here, helping us doing whatever was needed."

She said Chinn volunteered in the food pantry at a local church and helped prepare their holiday meals and aided with bingo events.

"For 25 years, Ralph was a proud, active member of Kiwanis," Donahue said. "There, he was involved in running the club and served as president ... he served [on the] board of directors [and] he found time to be an advisor to many club presidents over the years."

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Donahue said Chinn volunteered during Kiwanis events that coincided with Ocean Pines Community Center events.

"You could find him all the time making pancakes in the kitchen. And if you never had one of Ralph's pancakes, you missed out," she said. "He did all of our events – our Breakfast with Santa and our Breakfast with the Easter Bunny. He was also at all the hot dog sales, spaghetti dinners, Concerts in the Park, boardwalk car raffles, and Salvation Army [events]."

Donahue said he also made pancakes during a special annual breakfast for Recreation and Parks staff.

"That was just on him – it was not part of the Kiwanis. He





### Local students benefit from inaugural 'Back to School Bash'

More than 160 backpacks, plus a large amount of school supplies, were collected during the inaugural Back to School Bash held Aug. 27 in Ocean Pines.

Recreation and Parks Director Debbie Donahue said about 150 people attended the event, which included games, water slides and moon bounces for children.

Recreation Program Supervisor Kyle Jarmon organized the Back to School Bash on behalf of the Ocean Pines Recreation and Parks Department.

"The event went very well, and I thought we had a great turnout," he said. "For a first-time event, it was nice to see so many people come out, drop off supplies, and just have fun."

Jarmon said 169 backpacks were donated, along with scores of loose school supplies. The backpacks and supplies were donated to local schools through nonprofit Worcester County GOLD.

"That was a lot more than I expected. Being a first-time event, it's hard to have a good gauge on how it's going to go, so it was nice to have this be the result. There's going to be a lot of kids getting a lot of good stuff," he said.

"Honestly, my mind is blown by the whole thing," Jarmon continued. "I didn't expect it to be that big of a turnout. And I can't wait to see what kind of improvements we can make in the future, to make it even bigger next year."

Donahue said she was grateful to everyone who attended the event, and especially to those who donated supplies. "We're very happy to have supported such a worthy cause, and we know Worcester County GOLD will put those supplies to good use," she said. "For our first event, this was very successful."

Worcester County GOLD Executive Director Nicholas Cranford said the increased cost of basic needs, including school supplies, continues to squeeze Worcester County residents. Because of that, annual donation drives are vital to the success of at-risk students in the county.

"We are so thankful for the incredible amount of school supplies the Ocean Pines community donated to support this event and its mission to prepare local children for the school year and reduce the burden on families with low income," Cranford said. "Thanks to supporters like those who contributed to this event, GOLD is providing school and grade-specific supplies for over 400 local students identified as needing a helping hand. Together, we've helped these students toward equitable education and allowed them to blend in with their peers."

ince 2017, Jeremy Goetzinger has been a friendly and helpful presence at the front desk for Ocean Pines Aquatics. He also happens to be one of the top paracycling athletes in the U.S.

Goetzinger was born in Washington, D.C., grew up in Waldorf, Maryland and later lived and worked in Las Vegas as a project manager and electrician.

In his 20s, he was diagnosed with a rare condition called Buerger's disease that affects blood vessels in the body, most commonly in the arms and legs. That led to the amputation of both legs and several fingers.

"It's something that only happens to one in 800,000 men in their 20s, and it

basically it cuts the circulation off to your fingers and toes," he said. "I went through seven or eight amputation surgeries and of course it became difficult to maintain the



construction job, so I kind of did a 180 with my health."

He said that included eating better and playing sports.

"I started doing some of the things that we always say

we're going to do as far as my health and athletics," he said. "I played wheelchair basketball for three years and won a national championship in 2011 for the NWBA (National Wheelchair Basketball Association), and then right after that is when I met Katie."

### Living and working in Ocean Pines

His wife, Katie, also grew up in Waldorf and worked as a summer camp counselor in Ocean Pines while in college. That connection led the couple back to the community in 2013. They have a 10-year-old daughter, Paisley, and another child on the way.

"We moved here so Katie could work here and so we could raise our kids here," Goetzinger said. "She had always wanted to live here, and her old boss said she would love to have Katie as an employee. We came down, house hunted for two weeks and bought a house, and she started working right away."



Katie became the program supervisor for the Ocean Pines Recreation and Parks Department, and Goetzinger stayed at home with Paisley until she was old enough for school. He worked at the Ocean Pines Racquet Center for two summers and then took a job with Ocean Pines Aquatics, where he's worked for the last five years.

At Aquatics, Goetzinger handles reservations and quest check-ins. He's also been instrumental in the department's adoption of the Northstar software systems.

During the summer, the front desk role can be a busy one, with scores of swimmers coming to the use the pools.

Despite the rush, Goetzinger is a dependably calm and smiling face at the front desk.

"The things that I've gone through with my health and surgeries just gave me a love for life," he said. "I just have the attitude that it's easier to be nice to everybody. I love talking to people and helping them any way I can.

"I also just love Ocean Pines," he continued. "Even today, I spent my whole morning running from place to place in Ocean Pines helping people."

### New athletic heights and nonprofit work

Goetzinger said there aren't enough people in the area to play adaptive team sports, so he switched to handcycling, essentially a three-wheeled bicycle powered by the arms rather than the legs.

He also became involved in nonprofit work with Achilles International of Maryland, an organization that promotes disabled athletes.

"I just knew that there was a need on the shore to help people with disabilities get out there and participate," he





## said. "We basically helped anyone with any physical disability participate in mainstream sports."

For two years, funds from the Freedom 5K event hosted by Ocean Pines Recreation and Parks helped to sponsor

food and snacks for the roughly 100 paracyclists who participated in the annual Marine Corps Marathon.

"For almost 100 people Ocean Pines basically sponsored their pizza parties and all of their Gatorades and peanuts," he said.

Because of his involvement in veterans' groups, Goetzinger also worked with

the late Anna Foultz and her Star Charities nonprofit. Foultz presented a \$1,500 check to Goetzinger and Achillies International in October 2019, one month before she passed away.

"Her charity helped us out and, me not being a veteran, I took all that money and we sponsored another dinner at the Marine Corps Marathon, and then we helped two local veterans buy equipment," Goetzinger said.

Goetzinger said his Achilles International chapter closed during the pandemic, in part because there just were not enough local people taking advantage of the funding.

"It was hard to get that handful of people out of the house to participate, and I didn't want to collect funds through a nonprofit just for myself," he said. "But we would always do it again if we could."

Goetzinger, however, continues to compete and excel in both regional and national competitions.

He finished second in the Mid-Atlantic Para-Cycling Series in 2018, and first in 2019, 2021 and 2022. He's also placed near the top in the New York City Marathon and the Marine Corps Marathon.

"Next year, the goal is to try to win the Mid-Atlantic region again, and that has six-to-eight races each year. I also hope to win the New York City Marathon," he said. "I've gotten as high as fifth place in that event."

#### Loving the community

Goetzinger credited the Aquatics Department's recent financial success to the management of Aquatics Director Kathleen Cook.

"Kathleen has used the staff in a more meaningful way than in years past, and that helped minimize some of the expenses that weren't creating great revenue," he said. "It's really worked out in the department's favor. She has Michelle [Hitchens] that's handling all the classes and swim lessons, and then she's used myself and another front desk

staff member to help keep things running smoothly."

Goetzinger said both he and Katie "just love working for Ocean Pines."

"I look forward to every summer and offseason to seeing two groups of Aquatics members and guests. I also love working the birthday parties there and going the extra mile to make sure all the residents

and guests that come there are happy," he said. "I think Katie takes the same approach to her job and her programs.

"We love it here, and we plan to be here for as long as Ocean Pines will have us. We always just try to be positive, and to encourage people to come and participate in all the things that we have," he continued. "And, of course, we're both really looking forward to welcoming the new baby in April."

#### OPMGA announces 2022 tournament winners

### Mumford's Landing Boat Ramp gets major renovation

Improvements to the Mumford's Landing Boat Ramp are earning rave reviews from one local group.

Public Works Manager Nobie Violante said a new gangway, bumpers and boards were put into the structure about a month ago.

"We put new walkways from the top of the fixed dock to the floating dock. They used to be wood, and we replaced them with galvanized aluminum so they will


hold up better," he said. "We also put new boards on the floating part and new bumpers all the way around it."

He said Marina Dockmaster Ron

Fisher added throw rings for safety, in case someone falls into the water.

"The walkway was pretty shaky before, so we basically rebuilt it," Violante said. "All in all, our maintenance team worked on it for about a month."

After the work was finished, Violante said Fisher sent a note letting him know how pleased everyone was with the finished product.



John Latham from the Marine Activities Advisory Committee said his group conducted a community survey earlier this year, asking for input on various projects and needs, and the Mumford's Landing Boat Ramp was a major concern.

"[There] was a safety concern at the Mumford's Boat Ramp regarding the hand railings, pier walkway, side rub rails, and lack of safety ring," Latham said. "Our committee shared the findings with [General Manager] John Viola, and he reviewed and worked with his leadership team to gain the proper approvals to upgrade and make needed repairs."

Latham said he and the other committee members were also happy with the results.

"The project was recently completed, and it is a very nice improvement for our community," he said. "Our committee will continue to encourage community owners to share ideas and we will work to help make recommendations to the OPA Board. The committee remains very excited to help make recommendations for the betterment of the entire community."

#### 'Floating planters' add color, environmental benefits to North Gate Pond

Floating island planters in the North Gate Pond in Ocean Pines could be the first of many in the community.

Installed as a pilot program by Public Works, the planters 42 benefit the pond and local wildlife and provide an aesthetic pop to the landscape.

Landscape Supervisor Tony Howard said the idea came from a pesticide certification course.

"We take regular courses to keep our pesticide license up, and they were talking about how floating plants can make an environmental impact by cleaning the water, and I thought it was something we could make," he said.

Howard used aquatic grasses in the first planter, along with some irises for color.

"We could actually put anything out there," he said. "You can grow vegetables or grass, or anything that can be done with hydroponics."

He said the planters help filter the water by pulling nutrients out of the pond through their roots.

"With the algae growing, and feces from the ducks and geese contaminating the water, this will help to clean some of that out," he said. "And they create a habitat and a refuge, providing structure and cover for small fish, tadpoles, frogs and turtles."

The planters also help beautify the landscape.

"There's an extra added

bonus with the color, and they attract pollinators and birds, so it's its own little ecosystem and habitat," Howard said.

Howard hopes to build new planters this fall that he said would be cheaper and lighter. The plants will need time to take root and grow over the winter. If everything goes as planned, they will be put into the North Gate Pond next spring.

He would also like to see floating planters in Bainbridge Pond.

"At Bainbridge, right now, a lot of the water is green from the algae blooms, so the planters should help with that," he said.

If the early pilots continue to have success, there could be many more in the future, all over Ocean Pines.

"I definitely wouldn't mind doing it," Howard said. "It beautifies everything with all of the color, and there's so many benefits from it. It's not just cleaning the water, it's creating an environment for all kinds of wildlife, and you're getting more beautification out of it because you can plant whatever you want. There are so many different plants out there that will work. It's endless."

### **Keeping Ocean Pines beautiful**

The Compliance, Permits, and Inspections (CPI) Department has received numerous complaints regarding trash cans or loose trash bags being left by the road after trash service days.

Section 8.A.i. of the Declaration of Restrictions states, "Every outdoor receptacle for ashes, trash,

rubbish or garbage shall be screened or so placed and kept as not to be visible from any street, waterway or golf course within the Section or Subdivision at any time except during refuse collections."

Section 500.2.B. of the Architectural Review Guidelines states, "Trash and rubbish containers are required and shall be concealed. An enclosed service area, large enough to store two (2) 20-gallon containers for ashes, trash, rubbish,



or garbage, shall be required. An enclosed garage, shed or utility structure, satisfies this requirement if utilized for this purpose."

We appreciate everyone complying to this regulation to keep Ocean Pines looking beautiful!

Another regulation that is looked over way too often is the lack of a house number. This is not only in violation of the Architectural Review Guidelines, but also a safety issue if police or fire/EMS cannot find your property.



Section 500.2.A. of the Guidelines states, "The street address house number shall be posted to be visible from the street. It may be displayed on the front of the house or on a sign in the front yard. House numbers shall not be less than four (4) inches or no greater than eight (8) inches in height, and visible from the street."

An option to comply to this regulation is to order your number plate sign from the Ocean Pines Volunteer Fire Department. The signs are constructed of aluminum with green and white reflective material. The signs cost \$42, or \$58 for the sign on a weather-treated post. To order a sign, please stop by the south station, or download the form at https://www.opvfd.com/page/911sign and mail it to the fire department (information is on the form).



### Environment & Natural Assets Committee working for a better community

Over the past few years, community volunteers have worked behind the scenes on projects to enhance the Ocean Pines community for the benefit of all residents. An overview of a few of our agenda items and projects are as follows:

- Began a series of Canada goose control options to avoid future devastating culls. An initiative started in 2018 with a border collie program that included egg addling. Ultimately, the program was discontinued due to inability to be effective within budgetary constraints. The committee also began exploring other humane options, such as clean-up machines/attachments, turf grass unpalatable to geese, and natural buffers to plant around ponds, which would also help control erosion issues (buffer zones is a current project underway). New signs discouraging feeding ducks and geese were designed and posted around ponds. These educational signs explain the reasons not to feed waterfowl.
- Began participating in the new Maryland Coastal Bays Program "Bay Day" event. We provided funding for the 2019 Bay Day and your E&NAC volunteers spent Bay Day staffing an educational booth.
- Provided funding to install pollinator gardens at Whitehorse Park as part of Bay Day and subsequently at the Swim and Racquet Club.
- Investigated utility box painting in OP similar to Ocean City. For various reasons, we decided not to proceed and this program was not adopted.
- Worked with Public Works to aggressively target and eliminate/manage invasive phragmites in several areas.
   One committee member drove around to identify where phragmites were growing and made a list of locations for Public Works.
- Worked with Protectors of the St. Martin River to help overturn zoning for chicken farms at proposed CAFO (Confined Animal Feeding Operation) planned for Peerless Road.
- Initiated and continue to participate in partnerships with Maryland Coastal Bays Program and Assateague Coastal Trust.
- Began an extensive investigation of the Route 90 pond that is a true natural asset unknown by many Ocean Pines residents. Our committee is considering several recommendations for improving the pond's access by residents while protecting the natural environment for wildlife.
- In late 2020, the committee initiated, through Assateague Coastal Trust, PCR water testing (DNA source pond water testing) to identify sources of pond pollution. The results of these tests were interesting but ultimately proved that geese, dogs and human

- contamination, although present, does not pose a health hazard to residents.
- Reviewed free newspaper distribution in Ocean Pines and control procedures by distributors to ensure plastic bags are not pollutants.
- Written quarterly Green Street articles for this newsletter to keep residents informed and up-to-date on our activities. One article from the summer 2021 newsletter covered reasons why grass clippings should not be dumped into our canals and waterways. It is worth another look!
- Members have been in discussions to address surcharging events in Ocean Pines from heavy rains that might cause sewage to overrun the manholes in yards. During a recent heavy rain, one committee member drove around the neighborhood to witness such an event but found none. After inquiries were made, we found Worcester County budgets funding to cover replacement up to 50 manhole units annually and they address any issues of reported leakage immediately upon being notified. It appears conditions have greatly improved over the years with upgraded maintenance by Worcester County. If you incur an event of overflowing manholes, please call Worcester County Wastewater at 410-641-5251 immediately.
- The committee is currently investigating duck/geese crossing signs to ensure visitors to our area, as well as businesses in our community, are aware of wildlife crossings on Racetrack Road, Manklin Creek Road, Cathell and Ocean Parkway, to help prevent unwarranted wildlife destruction by vehicles and potential accidents caused by drivers stopping short to avoid hitting the animals.

Your Environment and Natural Assets Committee is a dedicated group of Ocean Pines residents committed to making our community a safe environment for all residents including our wonderful pets and fine feathered friends. To date, we have seven individuals that have joined the committee and participate in our monthly meetings. We welcome your ideas to help us in our endeavors and want to wish everyone a spectacular fall season!



#### Veterans Memorial Foundation releases educational video

The Worcester County Veterans Memorial Foundation in July released an educational video about the memorial, aimed at local fifth graders who annually take a field trip to the site in Ocean Pines.

The roughly 20-minute video highlights the history of the memorial, branches of the U.S. military, the value of service, and what it means to be a veteran.

Susan Pantone, who helped lead the effort to make the video, said the idea came up when field trips were canceled during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"My idea was, if the kids can't come to the memorial, let's bring the memorial to them," she said.

Volunteer Donna Hickey wrote most of the video narrative and Veterans Memorial cofounder Sharyn O'Hare wrote most of the extensive video credits, while Pantone did much of the background work. Many others contributed.

"It was definitely a group effort," Pantone said.

The Veterans Memorial Foundation began educational outreach programs around 2010, printing an informational booklet and hosting annual field trips for students, countywide.

Pantone said volunteer Don McMullen each year delivers the booklets to local schools, and then leads a tour of the Veterans Memorial grounds.

"He does a presentation where he hands out the booklets. And the video will now be a part of that, to help build background on the memorial," Pantone said. "I also think that teachers can use it for things like Veterans Day and Memorial Day."

Pantone, a former educator who taught at Berlin Intermediate School for more than a decade, said the video **46** became a passion project. Her father and husband are veterans, and she was born at Eglin Air Force Base in Florida.

"I really felt like I could contribute something," she said. "It was a lot of work and a lot of sleepless nights, but we got it done and I think we're all very pleased."

Pantone thanked the Educational Outreach Committee, the Veterans Memorial Foundation Board, and Foundation President Marie Gilmore for their support.

"This video replaces an outdated PowerPoint presentation that used to be shown at school assemblies prior to their field trips," Gilmore said. "It is really beautifully done, and the committee did an outstanding job pulling it together. We will be able to present this to groups other than students as well."

McMullen said the next round of field trips will start in

"We'll show them the video, answer any questions, and that way they're all prepared for the actual field trip itself," he said. "It's something that we've been talking about and thinking about, and now working on for the last few years. Now that it's come to fruition, I just think it's outstanding."

McMullen said the video includes an overview of the "Patriot's Pathway" that summarizes the history of U.S. armed conflicts. That feature of the memorial will become a central part of the educational tours.

"We also do the history of the flag. We have volunteers who take it from Betsy Ross to present day and then the Junior ROTC will teach them how to fold the flag. For a lot of the fifth graders, that's the first time they've ever folded an American flag," he said. "We also talk about democracy and how what they're able to do today is because of what these veterans have done over all these years."

McMullen said the best feedback he's received is from students who went on to join Junior ROTC programs in Snow Hill, Pocomoke and Berlin.

"Several of them have told me their interest was stirred when they visited the memorial, and they were inspired to get involved because of those field trips," he said. "That's just outstanding."

"I fell off the bike and hit the asphalt hard," she said. "I was lying face first




on the parkway when a gentleman in a white truck stopped and helped my husband pick me up. He also rendered first aid to my knee, which I greatly appreciated."

#### FAQS about leaf removal

#### Will Ocean Pines collect my yard leaves this fall?

Yes. Ocean Pines residents and property owners have several options for disposing of leaves that have fallen in their yards: bagged leaf collection, vacuum truck collection and yard waste disposal at the Ocean Pines Public Works yard.

Republic Services customers may also use their biweekly trash collection service to dispose of yard waste.

#### When will bagged leaves be collected?

Ocean Pines Public Works will collect bagged leaves from Nov. 28 to Dec. 22. Bagged leaves will be picked up on days opposite of Republic Services' regularly scheduled collection days.

If Republic Services normally collects your trash on Mondays and Thursdays, which are the scheduled collection days for all Ocean Pines homes north of the Route 90 bridge, Ocean Pines will collect bagged leaves in your neighborhood on Tuesdays and Fridays.

If Republic Services normally collects your trash on Tuesdays and Fridays, which are the scheduled collection days for all Ocean Pines homes south of the Route 90 bridge, Ocean Pines will collect bagged leaves in your neighborhood on Mondays and Thursdays.

## Is there a limit to how many bags I can place at the curb for collection?

There is no limit to the number of bags that Public Works will collect curbside. Republic Services will collect up to four bags of leaves for each regularly scheduled trash collection day.

## Can I include other yard debris (grass clippings, weeds, branches, etc.) with the bagged leaves?

Ocean Pines' bagged leaf collection is restricted to leaves. Republic Services customers can include leaves and yard debris in bags left curbside; branches should be tied in bundles no longer than four feet.

## When will the Public Works yard be open for yard waste disposal?

The Ocean Pines Public Works yard, located at 1 Firehouse Lane next to Ocean Pines Public Works and the south Fire

Department, will be open to Ocean Pines residents and property owners Nov. 28-Dec. 31, Monday through Saturday, from 8 a.m.-3 p.m. The yard will be closed Nov. 24-27 for the Thanksgiving holiday and Dec. 23-26 for the Christmas holiday.

## Can I bring yard waste in addition to leaves to the Public Works yard?

Yes. All types of yard debris may be dropped off. Please note that plastic bags will not be accepted – yard waste must be brought in loose or in paper bags only.

## When will the Ocean Pines Public Works vacuum truck collect leaves?

The vacuum truck will begin collection on Nov. 21. It will work its way through the community a total of two times.

#### Will the vacuum truck collect all my yard leaves?

No. The vacuum truck will only collect leaves in the drainage ditches next to the curb. Residents and property owners who would like ditch leaves collected should rake them to the edge of the yard closest to the street.

If it appears that leaves other than ditch leaves have been raked to the curb, the leaves will not be collected by the vacuum truck.

## How will I know when the vacuum truck will collect leaves on my street?

The vacuum truck location will be posted weekdays on the Ocean Pines website at www.oceanpines.org/web/pages/blogs during the leaf collection season beginning Nov. 21. Updates will also be posted in the Ocean Pines Association's weekly email newsletter, "This Week in the Pines." A link to sign up for the newsletter can be found on the homepage at oceanpines.org.

## The vacuum truck didn't stop at my house to collect the ditch leaves that had been raked to the curb. Why?


The vacuum truck does not operate in inclement weather, so if it is rainy or if there is snow, leaves may not be collected. Additionally, if there are cars, trash cans or other obstacles curbside, the vacuum truck will not be able to stop and collect leaves in the immediate area.



#### Seasonal Veggie Fritters & Dipping Sauce

Prepared by Kelly Williams, MS, CNS, LDN Nutritionist, Worcester County Health Dept.

#### **Seasonal Veggie Fritters**

- 3 c. shredded veggies such as broccoli stems, carrots, sweet potatoes or zucchini
- 1/2 c. white whole wheat flour
- 1/3 c. parmesan cheese
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. black pepper
- 1tsp. cumin
- 1/4 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/8 tsp. chili powder
- · 3 Tbs. green onions, thinly sliced
- · 1 large egg, whisked
- 2 Tbs. avocado oil
- **1.** If using broccoli, carrots or potatoes, bring 4 cups of water to a boil. Cook shredded veggies for 3-4 minutes and drain, squeezing out excess water. For softer vegetables such as squash, wrap in cheesecloth or a kitchen towel and squeeze out excess liquid.
- 2. Roughly chop veggies and place in a bowl with flour, stirring to coat.
- **3.** Stir in cheese, onions and all seasonings. Stir in the whisked egg until vegetable mixture is well combined.
- 4. Heat a large skillet over medium heat. Add oil and swirl to coat.
- **5.** Form 1/4 cup of veggie mixture by hand into a ball.
- **6.** Add the ball into the pan and flatten slightly with the back of a spatula. Cook 3-4 fritters at a time. Cook each fritter for approximately 4 minutes on each side or until golden brown.
- 7. Transfer to a plate lined with a paper towel to absorb excess oil.
- 8. Repeat procedure with remaining mixture.

#### **Avocado Yogurt Sauce**

- 1/2 c. plain Greek yogurt
- · 1 tsp. fresh dill, chopped
- 1/2 medium avocado
- · 1 tsp. fresh chives, chopped

In a blender or food processor, combine vogurt, avocado, dill and chives. Serve dipping sauce with fritters.




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
